At 5:30 p.m., Mayor Mulligan called the City Council meeting to order in Council Chambers, Lower Level of the City Building.

PUBLIC HEARING
2019 Tax Budget

Mr. Adkins explained that the Annual Tax Budget has two purposes. The 2019 beginning cash balances and 2019 projected revenues for each fund in this budget become the estimated 2019 resources for the City. The City's annual tax budget also supports the need for its annual property tax levy.

Mayor Mulligan opened the public hearing at 5:31 p.m. and called for those who would like to speak in favor of the 2019 Tax Budget. Hearing none, he called for those who would like to speak in opposition to the 2019 Tax Budget. Hearing none, he declared the public hearing closed at 5:31 p.m.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Jason Wargo

Detective Jason Wargo, Vice-President of the FOP 36 spoke in opposition to opening up the Chief's position to outside candidates. Thirty-nine union members voted and all were opposed. He stated that the officers in line to become Chief would be able to lead the department well. He stated that officers invest their lives in the City throughout their careers.

Holly Owens

Holly Owens, a 20 year member of FOP 36 commented that the Charter Review Committee made the recommendation to consider outside chiefs but, they did not consult the local FOP, or the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police, or the International Association of Chiefs of Police to get input. She commented that internal candidates have established relationships in the community and have put in years of hard work in the City. She stated that internal candidates know what resources are available, what works well in the community and are familiar with City policies and procedures. She encouraged Council to talk to the officers and stated that there are more than enough qualified candidates to lead the department for many years to come.

Lamar Ferrell

Lamar Ferrell, 1900 Johns Road, reported that the Hope Over Heroin Event was powerful weekend. Backpacks filled with school supplies and treats were provided to 100 children and 49 struggling addicts were connected with treatment opportunities. The event also gave families that had lost a loved one to addition an opportunity to grieve. Twenty-two people made a public profession of faith in Jesus Christ and were baptized. He expressed his disappointment that none of the City Councilmembers attended the event. He stated that he has been a pastor in the City for more than 20 years and the Police Chaplin for 15 years. He introduced the new Fire Chaplin, Jim Tinch. He encouraged Council to consider whether they wanted a hireling or shepherd to lead the Police and Fire Departments. A hireling is there just for the money but a shepherd leads with compassion, care and love. He stated that both Chiefs are doing an excellent job. He stated that when you hire from the outside, the incoming chief doesn't know or appreciate the culture of the department.

Frank Bauman

Frank Bauman, Firefighters Local 336, reported that of the 67 fire personnel asked; 66 were against considering outside candidates and 1 was for opening up the chief's position to outside candidates.

CITY MANAGER

City Manager Adkins explained that the Charter is about the process, not the people. He agreed that the people currently in place are well suited to run the departments. He provided a few scenarios where an outside candidate might be a better choice. He suggested that maybe the officer is a great test taker, but not a great operational leader; or if several leaders of the same department are wiped out by an accident of some sort, the people next in line to become chief maybe great officers but don't have enough experience to succeed at being the chief. He discussed the future possibility of a major scandal, such as the one that happened several years ago, in which a major culture change would be desirable. He reported that the residency rate for the police department is 40% and 25% for the fire department; so even with the current system, that means that the candidates for chief likely would not live in the City of Middletown. Mr. Adkins stated that he does not have a strong opinion either way on this issue but he wanted Council to hear both sides of the discussion before they made a decision.

Mr. L. Mulligan

Mr. L. Mulligan encouraged everyone to come out and enjoy the fireworks and the 4th of July parade. He thanked the organizers of the events for all of their hard work. He stated that the Charter Review Committee considered the issue of setting aside a portion of income tax for road improvement and that the condition of the City's roads is a great concern that must be addressed. He stated that there is a need to find a mechanism to provide more revenues for the streets even though the city has a good 30-year plan. Mayor Mulligan has suggested that Middletown City Council consider placing a 0.25 percent income tax increase for 10 years and having the revenues from the increase be earmarked for street and road improvements. This would allow the City to accelerate the necessary road improvements and execute the plan that Mr. Adkins has set forward.

Mr. Moon stated that both sides had made a great cases and that there were pros and cons either way. He would be voting yes on the issue and letting the public decide.

Mr. J. Mulligan stated that qualified internal candidates would have an opportunity but that the City would have a chance to hire the best candidate – internal or external.

Ms. Vitori stated that the culture of leadership is vital to the success of any organization.

Mr. J. Mulligan stated that the newspaper reported that one of the City's Assistant Fire Chiefs was looking to advance his career elsewhere and that this change would allow the City flexibility to hire the best candidate.

Mr. L. Mulligan expressed his appreciation to the Charter Review Committee for their work and to everyone that came out to speak. He stated that nine years ago, the last Charter Review Committee also considered this issue but did not recommend it to City Council. Since that time that City has seen several different chiefs, all of whom have built on the successes of each other. The City is fortunate to have great chiefs, great candidates, and great teams. He stated that this charter change allows the City flexibility and that it holds internal candidates to very high standards. He stated that internal candidates have a leg up because they are familiar with the community and the issues. He stated that situations may arise that the City may need the flexibility to consider internal and external candidates. He stated that he is for allowing the voters to decide this issue.

Ms. Vitori asked if the Charter language could specify an internal candidate would be considered first and only if no suitable internal candidates were found, then an external candidate could be considered. Mr. Landen responded that the Charter Review Committee did not lay out the mechanism. If it is approved by City Council and the voters, then the mechanism would be up to City Council.

Ms. Vitori asked if the language could be amended to indicate an insider preference before it goes on the ballot. Mr. Landen stated that it is possible; but that the parameters for the insider preference would have to be established and that there may be an issue with timing for the November ballot.

Mr. Moon stated that if this is approved by the City Council and the voters, he would be in favor of City Council passing legislation indicating a preference for an inside candidate.

Mr. Bohannon asked if the City had ever considered outside candidates for the chiefs positions and questioned why it is a big issue now. Mr. Landen did not think that any external candidates had even been considered for the chief's positions in the past but, the issue of considering external chiefs had been considered before by the Charter Review Committee and the City administration asked that Charter Review Committee to consider it again. The Charter Review Committee discussed this issue and decided to recommend to City Council to put this issue on the ballot. Mr. Bohannon asked about the Charter Review Committee process and asked if the committee reviewed the Charter and came up with changes or was the committee given a list of issues to consider. Mr. Landen stated that the administration suggests any issues that they would like for the Committee to consider, and then the Charter Review Committee reviews the Charter and is given the opportunity to raise any issues that they would like to. He stated that this committee did raise two additional issues that were not suggested by the administration. He explained that the administration is the most familiar with the Charter and knows what the issues are; the City Manager, department heads and City Council are all part of this process. Mr. Landen stated that the Charter Review Committee is not spoon-fed these proposals.

Ms. Vitori asked if this Charter proposal is approved by the voters, when is the next time it could be considered again. Mr. Landen stated that it would be five or ten years before the Charter Review Committee would consider the issue, depending on whether or not the proposal to change Article I, Section 5 is approved by the voters. He explained that City Council could submit a change to the Charter to the voters at any time. Ms. Vitori asked if this language is approved and then City Council approves an ordinance, how permanent is that ordinance? Mr. Landen explained that any ordinance could be changed by subsequent City Councils.
